

GETTING STARTED

If you would like to begin a Kids For Wish Kids program or start a Kids For Wish Kids club, we would be happy to help. Here are some tips to get started:

Invite a Make-A-Wish® representative to talk to your school

We have talented speakers, videos and lots of photos of our wish children. Once school kids find out about Make-A-Wish and see the smiles a wish can bring to a child's face, they are usually eager to become involved.

Designate one person to be in charge

An organized, enthusiastic person will keep the project on track. Whether the fundraiser is being held by a group, club, grade, or the entire school, making sure that one person, or a committee, is in charge will ensure that everything goes as planned.

Set a goal and chart your progress

Having a goal in place for your fundraiser allows everyone to stay motivated and work together toward a successful event. Whether you design a thermometer, bar graph or photo collage, this is a great way to actually see what you have accomplished and how far you haveto go to reach your goal. If you exceed your fundraising goal, this is also an easy way to show how your fundraiser was extremely successful.

Try to get other grades or your whole school involved

The more people involved, the more fun it can be and the more successful your fundraiser will be.





START A KIDS FOR WISH KIDS CLUB

If you are passionate about making wishes come true, why not start a club where other people with the same goal will help? By starting a club at your school, you are guaranteed to:

- Always have people to help with fundraisers, including setting up and cleaning up
- Have a variety of different people to come up with great ideas
- Have an easier time holding semester-long or bigger events
- Be able to make wishes come true for years to come!

HELPFUL TIPS

- Find a few friends who are interested in starting a club with you
- Find a sponsor to oversee the club. Ask some of your teachers or ask in the office if there is anyone who may be interested in being a club sponsor
- Talk to faculty in the main office to find out what paperwork you need and what guidelines there are to start a club in your school
- Fill out the paperwork with your sponsor and get the OK from your school
- Advertise your club to the school and get students motivated and involved
- Hold a meeting where all who are interested can discuss ideas

KIDS FOR WISH KIDS® FUNDRAISING RULES

- Make-A-Wish does not allow door-to-door or telephone solicitations.
- In order to help protect the Make-A-Wish brand, please be careful when using the Make-A-Wish® name and logo. For example, remember that "Make-A-Wish" is spelled with a capital "A" and with hyphens (not "Make a Wish"). Please list our name as Make-A-Wish® or Make-A-Wish® Greater Pennsylvania and West Virginia when referring to our specific chapter. Please also note that our swirl-and-star logo may not be altered in any way (e.g., do not change the logo to read "Make-A-Cake" or "Bake-A-Wish" if your school is conducting a cakewalk or bake sale).
- Make-A-Wish's mission is to create life-changing wishes for children, aged 2 ½ to 18, living with critical illnesses. Please
 do not refer to the children served as "terminally ill" or "dying" as these labels can instill a sense of defeat and can be
 counterproductive as wish kids fight to overcome their illnesses. Many wish children are able to beat their illnesses, and we
 believe in the importance of keeping a positive mindset.
- Please do not solicit prizes or request appearances of national or local celebrities or sports figures (including the Penguins,
 Pirates or Steelers and local media celebrities). It is important that these contacts remain true to the original intent to
 secure a wish for a child with a critical illness and not be used to secure items for fund raising purposes.
- Please keep careful track of money you raise and send funds directly to your local Make-A-Wish chapter office within one
 month of your fundraiser.
- If you are going to advertise your fundraising event outside of the school community, it is important that you coordinate this in advance with your local Make-A-Wish chapter office.
- The state requires that the following disclaimer appears on all flyers, tickets, etc. (can be in small print at the bottom):
