Her volunteer wish granters came up with the solution: members of local group Skeeter Creek performed for Lilly, as well as a crowd of friends and staff.



The annual Adopt-A-Wish campaign is kicking off its 25th year this holiday season!

All through the season, volunteers at local malls and businesses sell paper star "ornaments" to raise funds to help make wishes come true for kids and teens facing lifethreatening medical conditions. Local schools also participate in helping raise funds through to the month of February. Each star features the story of a local wish kid who had his/her one true wish granted by the Northeast New York chapter.

More than 200 volunteers, including wish kids and families, work in booths at area malls, helping to make the Adopt-A-Wish Campaign one of the most well-known and successful fundraising campaigns in the region. Nearly 100 wishes are granted by the chapter each year, which could not be done without the help of these volunteers and the funds raised.

The campaign will start on

Nov. 16 with a kick-off event at Crossgates Mall, and will run through the end of the year in Colonie Center, Viaport Rotterdam, Wilton Mall, Aviation Mall, and



Champlain Centre in Plattsburgh, as well as at branches of Trustco Bank, and many local businesses and schools. The cost of the stars will be \$3 each at malls and businesses, and just \$1 at local participating schools.

# **Chapter Facts and Figures**

#### **HISTORY**

Make-A-Wish® traces its beginning to one boy's wish. In 1980, 7-year-old Christopher James Greicius from Arizona was being treated for leukemia. Every day, he dreamed of becoming a police officer. Thanks to the generosity of some caring individuals, Chris was sworn in as the first honorary patrolman in the history of Arizona. Thus, the Chris Greicius Make-A-Wish Memorial – which later became the Make-A-Wish Foundation of America – was born.

#### WISH GRANTING

Volunteer Wish Granters are assigned to a child after medical eligibility has been determined. Wish Granters work in teams of two and visit the child and family to determine the child's heartfelt wish.

Once the wish is approved, the volunteers work with the chapter staff to make the wish come true. Our chapter grants 90-100 wishes each year and has granted nearly 1.800 wishes since 1987.

#### **FUNDING**

Make-A-Wish Northeast New York is a non-profit, tax exempt organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the IRS code and does not receive any state or federal funding. All funding comes from individuals, corporations, grants and special events. The average cost of a wish is \$12,000.

#### HOW TO GET INVOLVED

There are several different ways that individuals and companies can contribute to the Foundation. Individuals can become Wish

So perhaps the best way to mark these 30 years is through the comments of those who lived them -- the children, their families, the volunteers, staff, and leadership who know best what Make-A-Wish is all about. As you read what they had to say, consider how you can help make a difference for these kids in our next 30 years...

Channa, age 16, wished to visit Israel. She said that "It was a life-changing experience. It was even more than I ever imagined!"

For Jessica, age 5, her trip to Walt Disney World Resort was great. Her dad explained that the wish made a huge difference to the family on a "psychological level. It was like a celebration for the whole family" at the end of Jessica's treatment.

Melanie, received her wish at age 14. Now, years later, she said "It's something that I will never forget. A wish was just what my family and I needed—to get away together, and to focus on something other than my illness." She added "I feel like I'm living proof of the healing power of a wish."

wish has fulfilled her in more ways than I can count! Her smiles and laughter have been priceless."

The right wish for Joanna, age 11, was a Disney Cruise Line Land/Sea Vacation. Her mom said that Joanna "beamed with joy. Words can't possibly express what we feel in our hearts. We are so grateful."

For Sydney, Make-A-Wish was an opportunity to help. "I did two lemonade stands to help raise money for your foundation. I raised \$162 and I hope this will help a kid…"

For 17-year-old Heath, the perfect wish was his trip to San Francisco to visit Van's Skate Park. But it went beyond that -- one of his friends saw the impact of the wish, and wrote: "You have inspired me to help around the community, to work hard and become a better person. Gifts like these are impossible to buy. A simple thank you cannot come close to the awe and gratitude I feel."

Shania, age 7, wished to be zookeeper for a day. Her mom, Ellen, said that the wish gave Shania the strength to continue with her treatment. "We all have memories that will last a lifetime," she added.

"It's been more than 30 years since my son Chris received his wish, and I am still amazed and inspired how one little boy's dream to be a policeman has touched the lives of so many thousands of people." – Linda Pauling, mother of Chris Grecius, whose wish launched Make-A-Wish.

It was a Walt Disney World Resort trip for Jakob. His mom said that the 11-year-old "had the best



Yankees fan Bryan, 13, wished to meet Derek Jeter and the team. In a letter, Bryan's mother described the trip as a "fairytale dream. When we left the player's locker room, I said to Bryan, 'So how was it?' He looked up at me with dazzled and twinkling eyes and exclaimed, 'This was the BEST day of my whole life!' That smile still hasn't left his face, now weeks later... You helped give Bryan something to look forward to and I am sure this accelerated his healing. You really do make wishes come true."

A former chapter board chair, Leslie, said that "We want to ensure that every season is a season of wishes, because whatever the time of year, we don't want kids to ever stop wishing."

Anthony's mom said that the four-year-old loved the chance to meet Mickey Mouse and enjoy Walt Disney World Resort. She said this is just one of "the precious memories we will hold forever."

Wish mom, Dawn, spoke in broad terms about wishes. "Words can simply not express our gratitude for all you have done for our family. Thank goodness for your magical organization. Children and their families are both lucky and deserving of an organization devoted like you are to them."

Tim was "totally delighted," said his mom of the 14-year-old's trip to Florida theme parks. "Our wish granters were wonderful. I cannot express enough our feelings for them and their caring and for being our guides on this huge adventure," she said.

Former Wish Child Kelly said that at the worst of times, Make-A-Wish "gave me and my family something wonderful to look forward to." She said that her entire family needed something hopeful after such a tough time. "It was wonderful to be overwhelmed with something good and happy... something to actually get excited about and look forward to!"

Support also came in group-

sized bundles, like the Guilderland High School class of 2005, who said "Thank you for allowing us to be a part of such an incredible organization..."

Brian, age 15, loved his wish to ride sport horses in Ireland. His mom, Paula, saw the impact even before the wish happened. "I quickly came to appreciate the power of a wish, as it crushed the power of the cancer. It gave control back to Brian through the process of wishing, and he quickly began to dissociate himself from the diagnosis. He began to emerge as Brian again and it was a relief to see his spirit come back." She added, "The wish lasted about seven days but the magic of Make-A-Wish has lasted over 10 years and resonates in our lives today."

Looking back at the long line of nearly 1,800 wishes, one can see lots of smiles, more than a few tears, and most of all, hope. And looking forward, and working to ensure that every eligible child receives a wish, it's an anniversary to celebrate – and a milestone for a future.

#### Windy weather caused a delay in this year's Wish Jump, but there's nothing a little rescheduling can't fix!



# Diane Roberts: making a difference for 26 years – and counting

Even before Diane Roberts began her long involvement with Make-A-Wish, she had personally

experienced the *power of a wish*. Diane's nephew, Joshua, was granted the third-ever wish from the thennew Northeast New York chapter of Make-A-Wish. Joshua and his family experienced an amazing Disney wish in December of 1990. Joshua unfortunately passed away the following year, but Diane had seen the positive impact that a wish can have on a child and family.

For the past 26 years, the Northeast New York chapter has been fortunate to have Diane serving as a volunteer. Diane said she became involved because she wanted to help other kids and families to have a great wish experience. Diane and her husband, Wayne, became inspired to start fundraising for Make-A-Wish to help grant more heartfelt wishes for children, especially in the North Country. They founded the Joshua Roberts Snowmobile Ride, which took place in January for several years as a memorial to Joshua. Soon after, Diane became involved as a wish granting volunteer, and has continued in that key role since.

Over the years, Diane has been involved in granting about 30 wishes for area children and teens. These wishes ranged from room makeovers to shopping sprees to travel wishes. The first wish Diane granted was a computer wish, she recalled, and since then she has granted all sorts of wishes, including one for a full-sized backyard basketball court!

With so many wishes of many different varieties under her belt, she still remembers the details, but can't come up with a "favorite wish." Looking back, she said, "They all are favorites, because something happens at each wish that is special. They are all very special."

Diane works closely with two other volunteers, Jocelyn Recore and Kismet McCormick. Though three wish granters aren't typically assigned to a wish, this trio is an exception to the rule due to their combined enthusiasm and dedication to Make-A-Wish, said Erin Goodfellow,

Manager of Volunteer Engagement. "They work great as a team, more than once taking on several wishes at a time. They also take the time to develop that unique relationship with the wish child as well as the wish family," she said.

"I love it," Diane said. "What's nice working as a trio, if one of the wish granters can't make the family meeting (due to scheduling conflict), there's always another wish granter, you never have to reschedule. It's based on family schedule, not our schedule." Diane, Jocelyn and Kismet "divide and conquer" wish granting responsibilities to ensure each child gets the perfect wish.

Diane said that the families are what keeps her volunteering. "When I feel like it's time to pass the torch, I always run into a former wish mom and she thanks me for my involvement in her child's wish and it rejuvenates why we [I] do it. It's for the kids, it's all about the kids," she said.

For anyone considering becoming a volunteer wish granter, Diane said that they should go for it! "You get to meet extraordinary children and families. What they endure and what they go through is beyond words. It's is a very rewarding experience and I look forward to continuing to do it as long as I can," she added.

"We hope that Diane will be helping make

wishes come true for a long time to come," said Ms. Goodfellow. "We can always count on Diane to put her heart and soul into every wish, as she is whole-heartedly passionate about Make-A-Wish. We are lucky to have her as a volunteer and a wish granter, and wish kids and families are the ones who benefit," she said.

You can support Make-A-Wish Northeast New York in several simple and savvy ways—without reducing your income or diminishing your savings.

This is as simple as using assets that can be transferred to Make-A-Wish NENY such as bank accounts, retirement plans including IRA's, insurance, stock, or mutualfund accounts. Expressing your charitable intent is as easy as completing a POD (Pay on Death) or TOD (Transfer on Death) form. Some companies also call these beneficiary designation forms. These completed forms tell the account custodian what to do with the account after your passing.

You can name Make-A-Wish NENY in your long-term plans today without a negative impact on cash flow or lifestyle. Designate and donate with any of these assets. It takes less than five minutes of your time.

#### Benefits of Naming Make-A-Wish Northeast New York In Your Long-Term Plans

- You can make a gift that costs you nothing during your lifetime.
- You can make a gift and leave your cash flow and current financial planning unchanged.
- You can make a gift with appreciated assets and save taxes, for both you and your heirs.

#### **Retirement Plans**

All you need to do is request (and complete) a new beneficiary designation form from your plan administrator. A gift of retirement assets has the added advantage of being among the most tax-wise ways to make an estate gift. This is because your retirement assets, if left to individuals (other than a spouse), will be subject to income tax in addition to any applicable

estate tax. With a gift to a nonprofit such as Make-A-Wish NENY, 100 percent of the funds are available for charitable purposes. If you want to remember us in your estate plan, it is often better to leave other types of assets – cash, securities, real estate – to your heirs and give the more heavily taxed retirement asset to charity.

#### Stocks and Investments Fund Accounts

Ask the brokerage or mutual fund custodian for a TOD form. Some companies also call these beneficiary designation forms.

#### Life Insurance

Ask the insurance company for a TOD form. You can name a single charity or multiple ones. Make-A-Wish NENY receives all or a portion of the death benefit associated with your life insurance policy. As an alternative to naming Make-A-Wish NENY as the beneficiary, you can transfer ownership of the policy while you are still living. Transferring ownership results in income tax savings in the year of the gift.

#### **Bank Accounts**

Ask the bank for a POD form. After your passing, funds remaining in the checking or savings accounts will be transferred to Make-A-Wish NENY.

\*\*Always be sure to consult your personal accountant or tax advisor before making any estate planning decisions. Staff at Make-A-Wish Northeast New York is also available to help make this process a smooth and gratifying one.

# WHAT DO THESE 20 COMPANIES HAVE IN COMMON?

They are the top firms which provide matching funds to increase your donation to charities – but only if you take the time to set the process in motion.

Here's an example of how it works: You or your spouse are employed (in some cases retirees are also eligible) by a company on this list, or one which has a similar program. Your employer may match 1 for 1, which means for every dollar you donate, they donate an additional dollar. Your personal donation is mailed to Make-A-Wish NENY, then you contact your employer and complete a matching gifts form, often online.

Your employer will work with us to verify your gift, ensuring it meets their matching gift guidelines. At the end of the calendar year, Make-A-Wish will receive a check from the company that includes their match of your donation. In short, your gift is more powerful, and it didn't cost you a thing!
