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

We all know that we are not yet to the point where everything is returning to "normal" (however that is defined these days). But across the country right now, all 59 chapters of the Make-A-Wish® Foundation have or are preparing reemergence plans, looking ahead to the day when we can grant EVERY type of wish, especially those involving travel.

And we **hope** that that day is drawing ever closer.

"The Make-A-Wish mission is rooted in our passionate desire to create hope, and then to foster it within each and every wish family we serve," Make-A-Wish Northeast New York CEO William C. Trigg, III, said "This is what we do when we grant life-changing wishes for children with critical illnesses.


"Even during this unprecedented time in our history, we have not wavered from that commitment; granting the wishes we are able to grant now, while preparing for the wishes we can safely grant in the months ahead."

Since last July, after a three-month pause at the onset of the pandemic, the chapter has continuously granted wishes, albeit not at the level we typically achieve in an otherwise normal year. The notable exceptions: travel and large-gathering wishes, which make up a significant percentage of what the chapter normally grants (75-80 percent). Wishes we have granted since last July ranged from shopping sprees to swimming pools to puppies to backyard play structures. In









As for what the fall and winter will bring, well, right now, we will remain hopeful — because that's who we are and how we operate. Hope — shining brightly as we continue to make magical wishes come true for children and teens with critical illnesses — is the one definite.

We will be ready.





other words, the emphasis is on granting "I Wish to Have ..." wishes. (Note: You can read about some of these wishes in the pages that follow.)

As vaccines continue to become more available on a daily basis, and as businesses re-open more and more, hope grows, and people are feeling more certain that we are closer to the end of the pandemic than to its beginning. And yet, COVID-19 remains a serious public health threat. Consequently, Make-A-Wish America, following the counsel of a wide array of medical and public health experts, has not yet signed off on the return of travel and large-gathering wishes, and likely will not do so through the end of 2021.

"While there is room for optimism, we will continue to keep the health and safety of the children and families we serve at the center of all policy decisions we

make," Make-A-Wish America President and CEO Richard K. Davis said in a March message to chapter leaders.

"The COVID-19 pandemic is the largest and most complex challenge our mission has ever faced," he acknowledged. "We will not waste any time in taking steps to resume 100 percent of our mission as soon as is safely possible."

Thankfully, glimpses of normalcy are already evident within our chapter. While our Wish Gala on June 10 will be virtual in its entirety, it is shaping up to be one of the most compelling and inspiring celebrations of our local mission. Wish Fest at Riverlink Park in Amsterdam (July

'Unimaginable, Unforgettable Joy'

wo cheerful women greeted me in the lobby of Boston Children's Hospital, where I was being treated. One handed me a stuffed animal. My nervousness melted; this was different than the hospital meetings I had grown used to in my six years. These people were wish granters.

They knelt next to me. "If you could make a wish," one asked, "where you would go... or who would you meet?"

"To see my Grandma," I replied. I had a desire to spend a week together with my family; the thought of a trip to see my grandmother in North Carolina seemed unimaginable. However, the wish granters saw a wish much bigger than I could ever imagine. After learning about

my favorite movies and characters, my wish was determined to spend a week at Walt Disney World® Resort.

I had been in a constant battle dealing with a birth defect — I was born without an esophagus — and related complications that would end up requiring 11 major surgeries, rehabilitation, and numerous hospitalizations. Travel

to me meant trips back and forth from Latham to Boston. These out-of-state hospital stays would separate our family — most painfully me from my twin sister, Angela.

Spending a week with my family, my sister, without medical treatments — and at Disney? I could not imagine. Yet these women were going to grant me my wish.

That trip to Disney happened nearly 28 years ago. I do not hold many distinct memories of age 6. But that wish will never be forgotten. Flying to Florida first class. A day spent at each of the theme parks. Staying at Give Kids the World Village®, where at the end of the day we were greeted with souvenirs in our villa. Every moment was packed with surprises

and a gift.

It remains one of my limited childhood memories not clouded by the bright lights and harsh sounds of a hospital. I was treated like the most important little girl as we skipped lines and got called onto stages. The best part: Sharing it all with my twin sister. Angela and I missed many milestones together, but not this



I am beyond grateful for the social worker who referred me for my wish. It provided my family with a respite from my family's focus being on my condition. We could focus on being a family.

Today, I am a thriving 34-year-old. My experiences have led me to become a social worker for adults and children diagnosed with developmental disabilities.

And recently I became a wish granter for Make-A-Wish Northeast New York. All the memories of my first wish have come flooding back. I can't wait to bring the same unimaginable, unforgettable joy to a child I experienced.



A WALK, **AND A REUNION**

The Make-A-Wish Northeast New York Walk For Wishes has always been about more than raising funds for life-changing wishes.

The annual gathering at Joseph L. Bruno Stadium in Troy has also served as a reunion of sorts, where the extended Make-A-Wish family gathers to celebrate

the power of a wish®, and each other's kinship.

That was lost among so many things last year due to the pandemic when the Walk went virtual. But the chapter has slated its eighth annual Walk For Wishes to be an in-person event this year, on Aug. 14 at The Joe.

"We will be excited to once again be at The Joe greeting wish kids and families, volunteers and all who support the Make-A-Wish mission," said Kirsten

Broschinsky, the chapter's director of development. "It will be a relaxed, safe environment with necessary health precautions in place, but one that will allow Make-A-Wish supporters who have not seen each other in a while to catch up and share their inspiring stories."

That is also true among individual teams, particularly corporate teams. With

> many businesses turning to remote work during the pandemic, team building - at least in person — has taken a backseat. Raising funds for Make-A-Wish Northeast New York has long been lauded by employers and employees alike as a positive bonding experience.

"Now, with remote work environments, the Walk can be especially beneficial for such teams," Broschinsky said. "You can do good for wish kids and your

workplace culture!"

The Walk will commence at 10 a.m. that Saturday, with same-day registration beginning at 8 a.m. and opening ceremonies at 9:45 a.m. A family friendly event that is wheelchair accessible, the three-mile route in and around the campus of Hudson Valley Community College in Troy begins with a "Victory Lap" around the ballpark. (There is also an optional onemile route.)

Participants can set up teams, share their stories, and ask for support from family and friends. If you raise at least \$100, you get a prized Walk For Wishes T-shirt. Teams are already raising money: You don't want to fall too far behind in this race! Register your team today at wishwalkneny.org and share why wishes matter to you!

Each year, the Walk For Wishes brings together wish families, local businesses and community supporters in a celebration of the power of wishes in the lives of children battling critical illnesses. The Walk continues to grow and is now one of our most important fundraisers — and that's all because of YOU! And this year, we need you more than ever.

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Adopt-A-Wish Campaign Far Exceeds Expectations

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we knew it would be difficult to reach our goal for the 2020 Adopt-A-Wish Holiday Campaign. We realized mall traffic would be down, and there would be difficulty recruiting volunteers to staff our booths.

All that turned out to be true. And, sure enough, we did not hit our goal. We shattered it.

Make-A-Wish Northeast New York raised more than \$228,000 in our 28th annual Adopt-A-Wish Holiday Campaign, exceeding our goal by more than 30 percent! We raised more than we did in 2019; in fact, the total is the campaign's second highest in the past decade.

So how did this happen?

A stunning third annual Day of Wishes telethon, in which we raised \$41,760, including more than \$25,000 in day-of donations. Those totals eclipsed the first two telethons combined.

And area businesses, both employers and employees, stepping up to contribute far more than we expected.

There was Trustco Bank not only serving as a Presenting Sponsor, but its branches selling more than \$20,000 in stars, more than last year.

And Beekman 1802 and its "neighbors," contributing a \$10,000 donation to the campaign.

And Wish Champion Sponsor NYSCOPBA, sponsors PhRMA, Glens Falls National Bank, Alpin Haus, The Property Shop, and Coldwell Banker Prime Properties, and Day of Wishes match donors, including Chris and Christine Edwards, Ayco and other anonymous donors all contributing.

And there were many other individuals worth noting, ranging from our wish ambassadors to all those who gave at malls and online.

"There were many factors that went into the success of the campaign. What is clear is we could not do what we do without all our stakeholders being invested in and contributing to our mission," Make-A-Wish Northeast New York CEO William C. Trigg, III, said. "That's what we saw here: The Make-A-Wish community rallying to overcome challenges and obstacles to ensure we can continue to create life-changing wishes."

an annual end-of-season fundraiser for the chapter that involved him skiing with donors.

The first year's event proved to be a promising foundation. But the 2020 Ski For Wishes had to be canceled at the last moment in the early days of the coronavirus pandemic. The same went for the slated third annual installment this March.

But Weibrecht, a three-time Olympian, was not going to let a second season of snow go by without trying to raise funds skiing. So he started heading up to an Adirondack peak.

Actually, he started heading up to all 46 of them. Solo.

"This felt like a thing to do: Ski all 46 high peaks," Weibrecht said. "With Covid, we had to cancel Ski For Wishes the past two years. To keep that tradition alive, I decided to embark on my own Ski For Wishes."

Sometimes the skiing is good, sometimes sketchy along the narrow trails made for hiking. And that one time his binding broke and he had to go miles downhill on one ski? That kind of slalom skiing is not fun.

Two long-time partners of Weibrecht, Head and Stio, as well as his family's Mirror Lake Inn are supporting the efforts. Weibrecht won his Olympic silver medal on Head skis, and he has been an ambassador for Stio, an authentic outdoor brand based in Jackson Hole, Wyoming, the past two years. He is equipped with both brands as he tackles his Make-A-Wish mission.

He hopes to make a significant dent in peak quest by the end of the season, and pick up the fundraiser in the 2021-22 winter season.

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Wish Alums: You Can Be an Ambassador of Hope!


