Anthony's Wish a Milestone for Chapter

A fter Anthony went through the Workshop of Wishes and was told his wish to go to Walt Disney World® Resort would be granted, he was shown a video in which a worker from Disney's Animal Kingdom told Anthony how much she was looking forward to his visit.

At one point, the 7-year-old from Niskayuna asked, "Is this real?"

Yes, Anthony, it is.

Anthony's April trip to Disney was a first for him. But for Make-A-Wish Northeast New York, it's the 2,000th wish since the chapter began granting wishes in 1987.

"This milestone is a powerful reminder of all the lives that have been impacted by the power of a wish over the years," said Make-A-Wish Northeast New York CEO William C. Trigg, III.

Trigg has been CEO since 2006, and has overseen more than half of the chapter's 2,000 wishes to date.

"A wish, whether it be a trip to Disney, a backyard playset, meeting a celebrity or whatever else that can be conjured by a child's imagination, is not just a nice thing to do for young person battling a critical illness," Trigg continued. "A wish provides hope, strength, joy and confidence, and is a lifelong gift that can transform the lives of that child, their family, and even entire communities."



The beaming child and his family returned from the wish and were greeted at Albany International Airport by singer Madison VanDenberg and a news conference, where Anthony answered questions like a pro.

"It was amazing at Animal Kingdom and all the other parks," Anthony said. "At Sea World I got to see a shark, dolphins and I got to feed some sea lions and I got to see a killer whale show."





The family expressed appreciation of Anthony's place in chapter history, and what the wish meant during the 7-yearold's battle with leukemia.

"COVID started, and six, seven, months later Anthony got sick. The last two years have been a very long time in our life,"



wish dad Anthony said. "It's been very difficult in many ways. This gave us time away from the reality of what we've been going through. It gave us time to just soak it up, enjoy and live the life that we dreamed we would be having right now.

"This has been special from start to finish," the dad continued. "They really did treat Anthony and our whole family like royalty from the moment we stepped into the wishing room the first day, to the airport, to Florida and back.

"Having this time really gave us time to reconnect and get time we would not have had otherwise. It's something that we will always remember."

When the younger Anthony waited with his family at the airport to depart on JetBlue Airways for Orlando on his wish, he was bouncing in anticipation.

"Best day ever EVER," he said.

Upon his return, he summed up his milestone wish in words that brought smiles to everyone:

"The greatest week of my life."

Make-A-Wish Northeast New York began granting wishes in 1987. The chapter steadily built itself, extending beyond the Capital Region into the North County, to the point where today we can grant up to 100 wishes in a normal year.



As we celebrate the chapter's 2,000th

granted wish, here are other milestone Make-A-Wish Northeast New York wishes:

- **1998** Chapter grants its **300th wish**: Joey's wish to visit Walt Disney World® Resort and meet Winnie the Pooh.
- 2002 Chapter grants its **500th wish** when Billy and his family enjoy a Disney Cruise Line Land/Sea Vacation.
- **2004** The chapter grants its **600th wish**, to 8-year-old Lashanna from Schenectady.
- **2005** The **700th wish** to 6-year-old Benjamin of Glenville. Volunteer wish granter Toni Cowie is responsible for granting this milestone wish, as she is for milestone wishes 500 and 600.
- **2006** The chapter's **800th wish** is granted to Gary from Leeds, whose wish for an adaptive hobby room came true in February.
- Lindsay from Colonie becomes the chapter's **900th wish** and published author. Her wish includes publishing of her book, "Cracked Up," complete with a book signing and reception.
- **2009** The chapter's **1,000th wish** is granted, with 9-year-old Zachary being "slimed" at the Nickelodeon Hotel and Studios in Florida.
- **2010** The **1,100th wish** granted, with Kaitlin from Corinth receiving a customized bicycle and swing.
- **2011** Wish teen Julia is granted the chapter's **1,200th**: a trip to the Jersey Shore.
- 2012 Megan, an 18-year-old from Wynantskill, and Melissa, a 16-year-old from Schenectady, each picked a shopping spree experience, and the pair together marked the milestone **1,300th wish** granted by the chapter.
- **2013** An Albany International Airport celebration upon the return of wish kids Christopher, Austin, Zachary, and Emily and their families from Disney marks the chapter's **1,400th wish**.
- **2015** Wish teen Hannah's wish to go to Los Angeles for the People's Choice Award show in Los Angeles is the chapter's **1,500th wish**.
- 2016 Lucia's wish to visit Hawaii and swim with sharks is the chapter's 1,600th wish. ... Wish kid Landon is sent to Italy to meet and be blessed by Pope Francis.
- **2017** Cameron's wish to go on his senior class trip to Europe is the chapter's **1,700th wish** granted.
- 2018 Before taking off on his wish the chapter's **1,800th** to Walt Disney World, 15-year-old flight enthusiast Ben (see photo) gets a complete tour of Southwest Airlines' operation, from the ground crew operations to the cockpit.
- 2019 Liam's wish for an adaptive playset is the **1,900th** granted by the chapter. A first-time wish granter on the wish is Justice White, who received her wish in 2005.
- 2022 Anthony's wish to go to Walt Disney World is the **2,000th** granted by the chapter. The 7-year-old from Niskayuna is most excited to see Disney's Animal Kingdom.

On the Road (And In the Air) Again

Travel Returns as Wish Option

The limo rides. The first-ever trips, and the lifetime of memories they provide. The airport greeting of the returning families — some excited, some weary, but many if not most transformed by their experiences. It's back. All of it.

After being grounded by the pandemic, Make-A-Wish travel wishes have returned. Vaccinated children and families are traveling again to Walt Disney World® Resort, and Hawaii and Alaska, and other U.S. destinations, reopening a wish category.

"We are thrilled to once again be sending off wish kids and their families to their dream destinations," said William C. Trigg, III, CEO of Make-A-Wish Northeast New York. "While we granted high-quality wishes throughout the pandemic after a brief initial pause, the one missing option was 'I wish to go.' And now our wish kids are on their way!"

This edition of *Wishmaker* is filled with examples of such wishes, some of which

have been idling for two or more years.

Hot and Cold

While some kids pine to see the bright lights of the big city, Emily yearned to see the Northern Lights. So, in February she and her family bundled up and headed to Alaska to take in the wondrous natural show. And, yes, it was spectacular.

"Due to Covid-19, the wait for Emily's wish was longer than expected; therefore she was upset at times," wish mom Melissa said. "However, once we found out about the final wish she was extremely excited.

"We have never witnessed Emily so carefree and excited about everything in life. Her appetite improved, her mood improved and her sleep quality improved," the mom said. "This trip not only helped her forget about her harsh realities, but it helped her move toward a healthier life.

"From the moment we stepped out the door we were able to let our worries go. ... Every moment of our trip was absolutely perfect."

Wish teens Emma and Brianna also headed west, but had a slightly different climate in mind. For their wishes, they went to Hawaii.

Drew had a less peaceful idea: He learned at our *Spark Joy* Gala! (page 11) that, at long last, he was going to WWE WrestleMania in Dallas, Texas.

And there were others.

But trips, with the uninterrupted family time away from medical appointments and worries, had been sorely missed the past two years in the Make-A-Wish world. Especially by children anxiously waiting to go on them.

Deepansh's wish to go to Disney so moved his dad Sandeep that that he wrote us soon after returning.

"This trip was beyond words," he wrote. "We were amazed by the hospitality, love and how much the WISH community takes care of the families to the very minute detail.

"From the time we stepped out of the house until the time we stepped back, you guys made sure that we were comfortable and happy. ... OMG it was raining surprises all along.

"You guys pampered our family like parents taking care of a newborn. We thank you guys from the bottom of my heart. This trip will be remembered."

Noella's New Room

ake-A-Wish Northeast New York wish kid Noella dashed into her new bedroom especially designed for her, made her way to the corner and silently took it all in.

And there was a lot for the 8-year-old to take in.

First, there is the special lighting, overhead and hanging in strands and even in a water tank, designed to create a calming effect. And over there was a ball pit, just in front of the hanging swing.

To her left: An ornate bed, with its mattress low to the ground. Noella, who in addition to battling an autoimmune disorder also lives with autism, likes to sleep on the floor. Beyond the bed is a chalk board taking up a full wall. Next to that is an interactive touch screen attached to wi-fi, where Noella can either stream her favorite shows, create art with a stylus or — via a split screen — do both.

"This is a calming room," wish dad Justin said. "These are things, typically, autistic children like."


Noella pondered her sensory room, then slid herself into the ball pit, which also captured the attention of her 5-year-old sister, Bria. Noella proceeded to take her time with each and every facet of her wish.

Noella is primarily non-verbal, but grew excited the more she explored her new room. (The room originally belonged to her older sister, Lilian, who gave it up for a smaller bedroom.) Finally, she let out an excited "Oh, man" – much to the delight of her family.

"For Noella, this will be a place for therapy and a place for fun," wish mom Deidra said. "With her having autism, she has a tough time out in the world, and this will be her safe space."

Joleen Bruyette and Bonnie DiGirolamo served as the wish granters for Noella's wish, which was sponsored by Price Chopper/Market 32 employees.

Amelia beamed – "We got a camper!" – as her 2-year-old sister Kimber fished through all the goodies inside (including






Disney fishing poles). Amelia's 4-year-old sister Hayden said, "Best day ever!" over and over.

Chulyar, clutching tight to her mom, Amber, didn't quite know what to make at first of the guy in the tattered top hat and tails who greeted her and her family at the Make-A-Wish Northeast New York office. He said his name was Tiddlywink Higgins, and he was, well, strange – in a funny and charming way.

Schulyar initially thought she was coming to the office with just her mom to sign some paperwork. "Do you know how hard it was not to tell you?" her dad Kevin asked her over lunch and cake afterward.

The reveal is the first for the Make-A-Wish Northeast New York Workshop of Wishes, seven years in the making. The initiative transformed part of the chapter's office into a special place where wish children can contemplate and declare their wishes, and find out their wishes will be granted.

"We are trying to make the first part of the wish journey more magical," Make-A-Wish Northeast New York CEO William C. Trigg, III, said.

The journey through the Workshop of Wishes is led by volunteer actors from the community called storytellers.

"Being a storyteller means that I help a child know that their wish is going to come true, and that we are going to make that possible with the wish granters," said Tiddlywink, aka Kristoph DiMaria. "We make the magic for them."

In the Workshop of Wishes, the child visits the chapter's Library of Wishes to discuss their wish. If they are decided upon their wish, they proceed down the hall to a special workshop room, where their wish is magically granted. (Yes, we keep the details sketchy to keep the surprise going for the next wish kid and family.)

"This was absolutely wonderful," wish mom Amber said. "The whole experience was just amazing."


We printed some flyers on social media, then put out a notice on social media.

The winner bought two tickets. She is not even that big a Marvel fan. But her 15-year-old daughter Mia, is – as in huge, down to the comic book collection she has from her dad and her Marvel-themed bedroom in the works.

"It took us a while to realize it is real," mom said.





ike a stone tossed in water, a wish doesn't just make a splash. It ripples – sometimes for years on end, touching lives in unexpected ways.

Matthew Rosato was 8 when he was diagnosed with a rare genetic disorder. Around his 10th birthday, Make-A-Wish Northeast New York granted his wish to travel to the Great Wolf Lodge Water Park in Pennsylvania.

"As Matthew splashed in that water from morning 'til nightfall, with nothing but light in his eyes and a perpetual giggle, I watched in awe at his complete and utter disregard of his illness while he leaned into each and every joyful moment of life," dad Steve Rosato recalled.

"Personally, I was forever changed. Something in that Make-A-Wish weekend made me, as Matthew's Dad, feel not alone and that it's all going to be OK. I don't quite know how or why. ... It's just a feeling one gets when love and hope are offered up so freely. And that hope still sits in my deepest core today."

That wish was more than a decade ago. But that wish touches the lives of other wish families, and one in particular, to this very day.

Lasting Impact

As manager of the Saratoga Olive Oil Company in Saratoga Springs, Steve Rosato enthusiastically took part in the recent Make-A-Wish Northeast New York Adopt-A-Wish Holiday Campaign, organizing the selling of wish ambassador stars at the company's Saratoga Springs and Lake Placid locations.

"This was very personal to me," he said. "That Make-A-Wish weekend was over 12 years ago for my son. And while textbooks still say his disease is incurable, Matthew, now 21, defies the odds. He sees only with the wonder of a child's eyes and miraculously loves all unconditionally."

You may not be surprised to hear that Saratoga Olive Oil was accommodating when one of its vendors needed flexibility due to family health struggles. Now consider the company had no idea the impact its Make-A-Wish fundraising efforts had on that same family. "One of our former neighbors sent us a photo from your Lake Placid location, which showed lots of stars on the wall," vendor Jerome Lauzon wrote to Saratoga Olive Oil Company owners Clint and Barbara Braidwood. "The little girl on the teal star is our Isabella. She was granted a wish a year and a half ago [a sensory room makeover] and was chosen to be an ambassador.

"Your participation directly affects so many children and families in ways most people don't realize. It's very personal to us and we can't thank you enough."

Neither Steve Rosato nor Jerome Lauzon knew the other is a wish dad. But Matthew's wish, more than a decade ago, impacted the Lauzon wish family today,

just as both wishes families' fundraising efforts touch the wish families of tomorrow.

And the ripples roll on.

"So, he decided he wanted a hot tub and wanted it to be




of both worlds! Our wish granters (Maura Fox and George Sicard) did such a special job of making his hot tub party a little luau!"

Five Questions for ... William Trigg, III CEO, Make-A-Wish Northeast New York

The longest-tenured CEO in the history of Make-A-Wish New York, Bill Trigg has transformed the chapter since coming on board in February 2006, overseeing 1,200 of the 2,000 wishes it has granted since its inception in 1987.

As part of a regular Wishmaker feature, we asked five questions of the boss:

1. In your 16 years with Make-A-Wish Northeast New York thus far, what has changed most about your job and the organization?

We continually improve every aspect of our work and business practices to make sure we are giving every wish child/ teen and family the most magical, lifeaffirming wish experience possible, and in the most cost-effective way possible. The evolution of our professional team stands out in how the chapter as a whole has become more sophisticated as an organization.

2. Much of what the chapter looks like today can be traced to your tenure. Of all you have been able to accomplish, what do you value the most?

Everything good we have accomplished has been, and will always be, a team effort. That said, I am most proud of: our work to improve and advance the health and effectiveness of our professional team; the establishment of three memorial wish endowments (totaling \$800,000), and the creation of the Workshop of Wishes to make the wish journey more magical and special for our wish kids and their families.

3. The chapter recently celebrated its 2,000th wish – and you have been CEO for more than half of them. Can you pick one wish that stands out on a personal level?

That is a difficult question to answer, if but I had to choose one that was

particularly compelling for me on a personal level, it would be Kelly's wish to go to the Summer Olympics in England in 2012. Kelly dreamed of being an Olympic swimmer until she was diagnosed with cystic fibrosis. Knowing that her being able to see the U.S. Swim Team at the Games was her heartfelt wish motivated me to raise the funds to make it happen.

4. In addition to being the CEO of the chapter, you are also a volunteer wish granter. Which Make-A-Wish role is more fun? The one you get paid for or the one you do for free?

Actually, both! Being CEO is very gratifying and fun, with face-to-face interactions with wish kids and families, engaging donors person-to-person about the joy of making wishes come true and working with my team to meet our fundraising and wish granting goals. Being a volunteer wish granter with my partner Heidi (who is also my fiancée) allows me to surprise our wish kids along their wish journey.

5. What would many people be surprised to learn about Bill Trigg?

That I am a big fan of the original "Star Trek" series and movies. I was able to meet William Shatner (aka Capt. James T. Kirk) not once but twice at the Star Trek museum in Ticonderoga. That was a lot of fun!

Wish Study Illuminates

This spring, Make-A-Wish released new research in the form of the 2022 Wish Impact Study that provided quantitative data to lend credibility to the anecdotal feedback heard regularly from wish families. The powerful results of the Wish Impact Study added to a growing body of research demonstrating how wish-fulfillment promotes mental and emotional well-being for children and their families who are facing trauma stemming from a critical illness.

The online study surveyed three groups of individuals: parents of wish kids, wish alumni and doctors. The parents and alumni who were surveyed experienced a wish between 2009 and 2019, allowing them to look back and assess the lasting, long-term impact of the wish. In total, 3,411 people completed the survey.

Wish parents made up the majority of respondents with 93% of parents acknowledging that their family experienced traumatic stress due to their child's critical illness. After their child's wish was granted, 94% of parents recalled seeing improvements in their child's emotional well-being, so much so that 91% of parents reported the wish gave their child a better chance of surviving their illness.

The wish alumni who completed the survey affirm the wish parents' sentiments. 87% of alumni stated that they and their families experienced traumatic stress during their battle with a critical illness. Their wish played an integral role in counteracting the mental and emotional distress. More than 90% of the alumni agreed that the wish improved their quality of life, brought their family closer together, boosted their self-esteem and gave them hope for the future. Interestingly, 60% of the alumni indicated that they had fully recovered from their illness, helping to dispel the common misconception that children must have an end-of-life prognosis to be eligible for a wish.

Perhaps the most overwhelmingly positive feedback on the impact of a wish came from the pediatric doctors who participated in the study. More than 90% of the doctors said they witnessed their patients overcoming feelings of sadness, hopelessness, anxiety and depression after their wish. Furthermore, 95% of the doctors reported the wish improved their patients' emotional and physical wellbeing; 75% of the doctors went as far as to state that a wish could improve a child's medical outcomes.

Jackie thought she and her family were at the Colonie Center Macy's for a sale. It turned out the Make-A-Wish Northeast New York wish teen was really there for a fashion show — and she was the star!

Jackie was led to a red carpet outside fashion stylist Karina Marte's office. After Jackie posed for photos, the 17-year-old learned her wish to go to Walt Disney World® Resort would be soon granted and she could pick out new ensembles to



take with her, thanks to Macy's!

"Omigod. This is adorable," Jackie said as she entered an interior dressing room filled with tops, pants, dresses and footwear, among other goods. "I have no words. I really have no words at all."

> "Try on all of this," said Ola Mancellari, Macy's manager of business administration.

So Jackie did, under the watchful eyes of mom Amy, dad Tom, sister Caroline, Macy's staff and wish granters Sandi Worona and Laurie Abelson. (Store manager Hillary Simpson also stopped by the wish reveal/show.)

Jackie tried on clothes, and for certain outfits made her way back to the red carpet. After a few



trips, she navigated the runway like a seasoned pro.
