




With our gratitude

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'ill never forget the day that changed my life forever. I felt an extreme sense of emptiness. From that day forward, I lost a sense of control that I am still working to regain.

On April 10, 2016, I learned I had epilepsy. I was just 12 years old.

Epilepsy has changed my life in so many different ways: dozens of hospital visits, doctor appointments, 911 calls and more. This disorder does not define who I am, but it has shaped who I am.

It changed me into a person who wants to help others just like me. I care a lot, especially for people who suffer from this awful disorder. I wish I could take away the pain of anyone who lives with this. I can't.

But I can do something to help, thanks to a late-night idea, and Make-A-Wish.

No Answers, Then One Option

At a very young age, I started experiencing minor seizures. We went to my pediatrician multiple times, receiving no answers. It became something that we swept under the rug and began to ignore. In seventh grade, I began suffering extreme generalized tonic-clonic seizures. They became progressively dangerous, which led to my epilepsy diagnosis.

I was put on multiple medications, but they were not a permanent solution. After many late-night visits to the emergency room, I was recommended to Boston Children's Hospital. They ran multiple tests and attempted a surgery, but it was just too dangerous. I was then referred to a very experienced team of doctors at the Mayo Clinic in Minnesota. We thought it would be a stretch, but it was our only option.

In September 2019, we traveled to Minnesota. A prestigious team of doctors met with me and my parents to say they could perform a surgery that had a high chance of success. They would place a device called a Responsive NeuroStimulator (RNS) that stimulates my abnormal brain waves. This was my only option for a shot to be seizure-free.

On Dec. 3, 2019, Dr. Kai Miller, a wellknown surgeon, performed a successful eight-hour surgery. Every three months I pay a visit to Mayo Clinic to adjust the simulations, and I am still on medication.









But I am definitely on the right path to a solution.

A Wish, and an Idea

As a young woman with epilepsy, I qualified for a Make-A-Wish Northeast New York wish. Over the years, I have had many different ideas for my wish but never made a final decision. A few months ago, I met with a team that works for Make-A-Wish. We brainstormed for more ideas. Nothing really felt right. Until ...

One night I was lying in bed thinking, If I could wish for anything in this world, it would be to help others. When I was first diagnosed, without medication I was having constant seizures. From those days forward, I could never imagine what it would be like if I couldn't afford the cost of seizure medication. I decided I wanted to use this Make-A-Wish opportunity to make a change and help people just like me.

My wish is to create a dedicated fund within the Epilepsy Foundation of Northeastern New York that will help people with epilepsy pay for their medication. The No. 1 reason for skipping doses is cost. I want to help



others and possibly even change their life with this fund.

The Maria's Epilepsy Medication Emergency Fund (mariaepilepsyfund. org) will help raise awareness and money for people who are struggling to afford seizure medication. If I had to choose one thing to fix in this world, it would be a cure for epilepsy.

One day, I learned my life had changed. But one day, hopefully soon, I can change the life of others.

Isabella, who faces physical and developmental challenges, saw her life profoundly impacted by her sensory room wish.

"Isabella lights up every time she goes into the sensory room," wish mom Cristina said. "She still doesn't smile much. She has a lot of pain and discomfort. But she loves it."

The room features assorted apparatus, including a padded floor and harness and track system, which gives Isabella newfound mobility.

"It has various pieces of equipment that help her experience things that maybe a typical child might be able to experience, like trying to walk and crawl," Cristina said.

The wish mom said the room has impacted the quality of life of the entire family.

"The sensory room makes Isabella so happy," Cristina said, "which has been making our lives so much better."

For Portia, a visit to Walt Disney World® Resort meant so much more than just a chance to meet some of her favorite princesses, such as Belle.

"It gave her a break," wish mom Jessica said. "It gave her a chance to be a child again, and to

Portia's treatments dominated not only her life, but the entire family's time. Going to Disney provided a much-needed opportunity to re-unite.

"We spent a lot of time in the hospital, so it was nice to bond as a family again," Jessica said. "She got to spend quality time with her siblings. We have been going in so many different directions."

The wish mom said the impact of wishes on children is powerful and lasting.

"It just gave us hope," Jessica said. "The way she just lit up when we brought her into Disney. There is nothing that compares to that."

Wish mom Shantae struggled with how she would swing getting a new bedroom set for her growing daughter, Makaila. The mom got her wish — and so did Makaila.

Makaila's shopping spree wish included that new bedroom set, and so much more. "My favorite part is my bed because it's cozy," Makaila said, pointing out she loves her "Frozen" bedspread. "My wish made me happy."

Mom, too: "She is able to sleep better. She got to upgrade to a big-girl bed."

There was more, including a visit to The Disney Store and other shops.

"My wish [included] a Reborn [Baby] and Disney toys," Makaila said. "My wish made me excited."

And the wish made Shantae relieved

"She was so overwhelmed and so excited," the wish mom said. "Financially ... we would not have been able to get the things she wished for. It lifted the weight off my shoulders."

For **Gabe**, getting a swimming pool for a wish worked out for him and his family in all sorts of ways.

"I really enjoy swimming, because the summer was really hot this year – and I especially [enjoy] swimming with my family," he said.

"It helped us bond more, because we were usually separated in our rooms. But now we play together a lot more."

A pool also proved therapeutic to the teen.

"It helped comfort me and made me feel better," Gabe said. "When I am in the water, I don't feel as sick when I get off of chemo."

In talking about his wish, and those whose contributions made it possible, Gabe kept returning to one word: *Grateful*.

"I was really grateful," he said. "A lot of kids are worried about what is happening to them, and [a wish] makes them feel better."

Andrew has a favorite part of his wish, a new custom gaming computer.

"I am able to actually play more games now than I could play on a console," he said.

But the gaming setup means more than just being able to play League of Legends, Fortnite and Call of Duty®: War Zone. When he is in his computer chair, in front of his monitor, thoughts of his health woes melt away.

"The best part is when I'm playing games, I don't have issues," the 14-year-old said.

Andrew thanks those who donate to Make-A-Wish – "They are very generous" – and offers encouragement to wish kids waiting on wishes.

"It will come eventually," he said. "It's very worth it."

At Make-A-Wish, there is a saying: Don't wait for hope – create it. Which brings us to **Brandon's** wish.

Brandon's wish for a backyard playset was initially pushed back by a hospitalization and other factors. The 10-year-old and his family wanted the wish granted as soon as possible, which it was.

Just as winter loomed. In Plattsburgh, no less. And it was still perfect.

"It was exciting," wish mom Heidi said "He was looking out the window as they were setting it up. He just ran over and started playing. Oh, yeah, it was cold."

Mom did make Brandon put on his coat and hat first.

Brandon loves the swings, slide, walking on the playset's bridge and having picnics on its table.

"He got to play with it all summer," the wish mom said. "It was just one of those things he really likes. He still uses it a lot."

Wishes can be almost anything, bound more often than not solely by a child's imagination. But, again, more often than not, families talk about a precious gift that comes with a wish: *Time*.

Time to be together as a family. To bond. To put worries about an illness aside.

Wish mom Sarah said when her daughter Del had to go to treatments or be rushed to the hospital, that meant a 90-minute one-way trip from their Saranac farm, on top of any hospital stay. "Time got sucked away from us," she said.

But Del's wish to visit the EA Games headquarters, which publishes her favorite simulation video game The Sims outside of San Francisco, got some of that family time back.

Del visited EA Games, where she learned the how they construct the simulation game. (They even made her into a character.) But there was even more to the wish, which included trips to the Oakland Zoo, Fisherman's Wharf, Alcatraz, a candy factory and more.

"It was Cloud Nine for her," wish mom Sarah said. "It was a week of no stress.

"It was a 'Yes-yes' week," the wish mom said. "It felt like an intense family time week in a good way. We had lost so much time.

"It gave back time that was lost."
Sarah said she still marvels at the fact
that a wish covers every logistical detail for
a family, taking the stress out of travel.

"Everything was taken care — even things I couldn't imagine needing," she said. "It is magical."







ake-A-Wish Northeast New York wish kid Karson traveled down from the North Country for an overnight stay in the Capital Region, under the impression the trip was primarily a school shopping expedition.

As Karson realized what he was seeing, his jaw dropped and his eyes grew wide before he whipped his head toward his mom.

The next day, wish mom Holly said that Karson's excitement only grew when he got home.


"Karson absolutely LOVES his computer wish," she said. "He doesn't want to leave his room!"

The entire family has been energized by Karson's wish experience.


"Everything was absolutely amazing," the wish mom said. "Thank you all so very much."


















s you would expect of a legendary skier, it's time for three-time Olympian Andrew Weibrecht to head back up the mountain.

Make that mountains. And it's how he's doing it — and how he is coming down that makes it special.

Last season, Weibrecht embarked on a wholly unique fundraiser: He is not just scaling all 46 of the Adirondack High Peaks, but skiing down them. Here's the thing: Not all of those peaks are designed for skiing. Then again, if anyone can do it, it's this twotime Olympic medalist.

All this to raise funds to benefit the wish kids and families of Make-A-Wish Northeast New York.

The member of the Make-A-Wish Board of Trustees knocked out 21 High Peaks last season and hopes to complete the rest this season. Weibrecht has already raised more than \$11,000 toward the \$15,000 fundraising goal he seems destined to

"I've always loved the opportunity to work with Make-A-Wish, and since becoming a Board member I know firsthand the impact the fundraising dollars have," he said. "Skiing in the

Adirondack backcountry is a favorite pastime of mine, so naturally I was excited to figure out a way to merge those two passions.

"As soon as the snow flies this winter, I plan to be back on the trails. If you're interested in following along, check out my fundraising page (http://site.wish.org/goto/ Ski46) or Instagram (@andrew_weibrecht)."

When Weibrecht launched Ski For Wishes in 2019 at Whiteface Mountain. he envisioned an annual end-of-season fundraiser for the chapter that involved him skiing with donors.

The first year's event proved to be a promising foundation. But the 2020 Ski For Wishes had to be canceled at the last moment in the early days of the coronavirus pandemic. The same went for the slated third annual installment last March. (There will be no public 2022

So began this solo Ski For Wishes.

"No matter the circumstances, every child deserves a childhood," Weibrecht says on his page. "Life-changing wishes wouldn't happen without the power of generous donors like you. Your support gives children much-needed hope for brighter days ahead."

Sometimes the skiing is good, sometimes sketchy along the narrow trails made for hiking. And that one time his binding broke and he had to go miles downhill on one ski? That kind of slalom skiing is not fun.

"I've been hiking and spending time in the Adirondacks since I was a little kid and have a deep understanding of how raw and wild these mountains can be," Weibrecht said. "Being out so often this past winter not only heightened my respect for this landscape, but brought my resolve to see this challenge through to a whole new level. Broken equipment, aborted summits and freezing temperatures seem like a nominal entry fee to help support a cause like Make-A-Wish."

Weibrecht thanks Head and Stio, as well as his family's business, the Mirror Lake Inn, as founding supporters of this effort. Weibrecht won his Olympic silver medal on Head skis, and has been an ambassador for Stio, an authentic outdoor brand based in Jackson Hole, Wyoming, for the past two years. In addition, his newest fundraising supporters include Alpin Haus, CDPHP and NBT Bank.



Five Questions with... **Alyssa** Caroprese
