New research could mean more referrals! Make-A-Wish now has locally relevant, nationally consistent data that serves a mission-critical purpose of reaching the estimated **66 children diagnosed with a critical illness in North Dakota each year** who could be eligible to have a wish.

Our team's Medical Affairs Coordinator, Kelli Just, is busy utilizing this data to educate medical professionals and helping others in the general public understand who can refer a child, what the referral process is, and who is eligible for a wish. To respect the privacy of families, we only work with these approved referral sources: medical professionals, parents or legal guardians, and family members with detailed knowledge of the child's current medical condition. However, if you are not an approved source, you can play a role by sharing the referral inquiry form with the

family or asking them to visit our website. Each wish begins with a referral, and our vision is to reach every eligible child in North Dakota! Learn more about who can refer a child by scanning here.

WISHES THAT LAST A LIFETIME

ALUMNI REVISIT THE WISHES THAT HELPED THEM HEAL

Over the years we've shared how, statistically, wishes are medicine. For example, 9 out of 10 medical providers observe how the wish experience helps relieve a family from traumatic stress, and 8 out of 10 wish parents see their child feel a stronger sense of empowerment after experiencing a wish. When asked, 8 out of 10 wish kids stated that their wish gave them more courage to fight through their treatments, and 9 out of 10 reported they felt more confident and hopeful for their future.

Numbers and figures are a fantastic way to quickly communicate the impact of the wishes we as a community come together to grant. The true magic of a wish, though, is rooted in the memories wish kids go on to share, and the lives their wishes helped shape. In honor of our 40th anniversary, we reminisced with three wish alumni to see where their lives have taken them. Their stories are a reminder that joy can be found even in the toughest chapters of our lives – all you need is a little bit of magic!



ELLEN

I wish to meet the Air Buddies puppies

Ellen was 5 years old when she was diagnosed with leukemia. In December of 2008, her wish to meet the puppies who starred in the lovable Air Buddies movies brought her to Vancouver, Canada. Though she was young, her love of animals was strong, and she knew right away that meeting the celebrities behind her favorite movies would be a dream come true. Now 22 years old, Ellen is one semester away from graduating with a degree in Communication from the University of North Dakota.

Q: What do you remember about your wish journey?

A: I will never forget the amazing people I met while on set of the Santa Buddies movie, among them Anna McRoberts, the producer, with whom I still keep in contact 17 years later. I will never forget the "movie star treatment" my family and I received throughout my wish trip. Most of all, I will never forget the sense of normalcy and hope my wish gave me and my family as we navigated the scary and challenging journey that came with my cancer diagnosis and treatment.

Q: Did receiving your wish have any lasting impact on your life outside of your health?

A: Absolutely! My wish gave my family and me the opportunity to spend quality time together during an especially challenging period, drawing us closer, and it allowed me to make connections that will last a lifetime. Beyond that, Anna McRoberts gifted Rosebud, the only female puppy of the bunch, to me after filming was finished. Rosebud, then 4 months old, joined our family a couple of weeks after we returned from my wish trip, and she immediately became my best friend. She was by my side throughout

the rest of my cancer treatment journey, as I celebrated with family and friends at my "End of Chemo Party" two years later, and for 13 more years after that. She saw me through every joy, every heartbreak, every success, and every failure until I was 20 years old. Although we had to say goodbye to Rosebud in July 2023, only a month before she turned 15, her legacy lives on in the hearts of those she touched through volunteer activities with Make-A-Wish North Dakota, meet and greets with local elementary students, and all who visited my family's farm. I can't imagine a better, more long-lasting gift from Make-A-Wish North Dakota than Rosebud was.

Q: You're graduating soon! Do you have an idea of what's next?

A: I have accepted a position as Sales & Marketing Coordinator with a running apparel brand called ChicknLegs, and I will move to Cary, North Carolina to pursue the role this July while finishing up my last semester of college via online courses. I'm also training for my second half marathon that will take place in June, loving every minute I get to spend with my beautiful

baby niece, and soaking up all that this wonderful life has to offer!

Q: If there was only one thing people should know about Make-A-Wish, what would it be?

A: I want people to know Make-A-Wish doesn't just grant wishes, although that would be spectacular on its own. Make-A-Wish brightens lives and provides hope.



ELI

I wish to have my 1974 Pontiac Trans Am restored

Eli's wish journey was jump started by an unexpected swollen lymph node that led to a diagnosis of Hodgkin's Lymphoma when he was 14 years old. Just two weeks before his diagnosis, Eli had been gifted a 1974 Pontiac Trans Am by his late great uncle. Though in his possession for a short time, the car was packed full of memories thanks to the cross-country road trip he and his father took to acquire it. When Eli discovered he could receive his wish come true, he knew he would eventually want to take his driver's license test in the vehicle that was near and dear to him, but it needed much restoration before being able to get back on the road permanently.

Q: What do you remember about your wish journey?

A: I remember my wish granters were really nice and helped me feel at ease with the process. I really had a hard time deciding on my wish - it's really a tough question when somebody asks you to dream big and reach for the stars. I had many ideas pop into my head, but the one thing that kept coming back up was being able to take my driver's license test in the Trans Am. I was actually hesitant to even bring it up to my wish granters because I knew it was a really big ask, but they

embraced it made it a reality and went above and beyond my wildest dreams.

Q: Did receiving your wish have any lasting impact on your life outside of your health?


A: I have been able to meet so many interesting people and had many wonderful experiences that would not have been possible without my wish or Make-A-Wish ND. Everyone involved in the process of granting my wish went so far above my dreams - since my wish was granted I have been able to participate in many car shows, and have driven the car across the country in different car events - making many friendships that I probably wouldn't have without Make-A-Wish.

Q: What are you up to now?

A: My wife and I live in Sioux Falls, S.D., where I work as a broadcast engineer, maintaining TV and radio stations.

A: One thing that people should know about Make-A-Wish is that they are a truly life-changing organization for so many children and families. Looking back, I am humbled by how many people dedicated so much time to granting my wish. Langley, who was diagnosed with a congenital heart defect at birth, loved mythology and all things history related when they were referred to Make-A-Wish at 15 years old. Their trip to Egypt was the first international trip granted by

Make-A-Wish North Dakota and further bolstered Langley's love of archaeology and other cultures.

Q: What do you remember about your wish journey?

A: I remember my granters being very diligent about exactly what I wanted for my wish, making sure that I wrote down what I wanted. I also remember being able to just relax and enjoy my time on my trip without having to worry about going to the doctor's office or any of the travel bookings.

Q: Did receiving your wish have any lasting impact on your life outside of your health?

A: My wish absolutely had a lasting impact; I went to college and got my Bachelor's in Archaeology and have worked in both North Dakota and Minnesota doing field work. I have now changed career paths and am in my second year of mortuary science school, and that choice was also impacted by my experience with Make-A-Wish. I want to be able to serve families and decedents in the ways they want to be treated and make their grief an easier process for

Q: What do you remember about your wish?

A: The museum at the pyramids, it was absolutely my favorite part of the trip. I could have spent multiple days just looking at all the artifacts and mummies that are housed there. Seeing King Tut's burial mask was one of the most memorable parts for me, pictures do not do it justice on how beautiful it is in person.

Q: If there was only one thing people should know about Make-A-Wish, what would it be?

A: Even if your child, or you, don't think you qualify for a Make-A-Wish, please ask! I did not know I qualified for it until one of my cardiology nurses mentioned it to me and my mom and I'm so glad that she did because I may have never gotten the chance to make and get my wish granted if it weren't for her.


