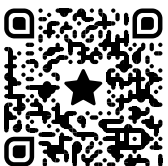
The Make-A-Wish Mid-South workplace giving program began 20 years ago in 2005.

Keeley's wish wasn't just a trip; it was liberation after a long medical journey. After years of being unheard, her mother Frances became an unwavering advocate, pushing through medical barriers until finally, at 12, a doctor listened. "We had to fight for someone to see her," Frances said. "Dr. Shane was the first to truly hear Keeley."

Receiving her diagnosis was overwhelming, but the promise of a wish opened a door to something more. "It was like freedom," Keeley said softly. "A break from doctors." She looked forward to each day with growing excitement, counting down and imagining what it would feel like to just be a kid again.

Keeley decided her wish was to go on an Alaskan cruise and experience the wonder of nature and the last frontier with her family.

The experience was transformative. Keeley flew on a plane for the first time, saw glaciers and waterfalls, and tasted crab while sailing past wild animals. **"Her face lit up," Frances recalled. "That joy stayed with her."**

July 4th fireworks painted the sky with color during their wish trip, but the real celebration was within Keeley; each moment was a reminder that life held more than treatments and waiting rooms.

"I didn't feel stuck," Keeley said. "I felt happy."

Wishes give children like Keeley the space to breathe: to be seen, heard, and cherished beyond illness. They deliver hope in the form of adventure, laughs, and joy that echoes through families long after the moment passes.

"It changed how she sees life," Frances said. "We'll never forget it." Supporting wishes means giving families memories of light that shine through even the toughest journeys.

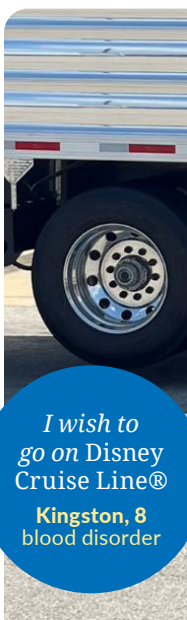

Kind Hearts Create Big Moments

If you've had the pleasure of meeting Jane Arnold, then you'd know she's the kind of person that radiates warmth and purpose. Her journey to becoming the Arkansas Volunteer Coordinator was not just her next career move—it was a calling.

"I've always been drawn to service," Jane shared. "Growing up, my family taught me that caring for others is just what you do. It's part of being human." That mindset followed her into college, where she joined Chi Omega, a sorority that supports Make-A-Wish as its national philanthropic partner.

"That was my first real connection to the mission. I saw firsthand how powerful a wish could be."

Years later, when Jane was looking for her next step professionally, a friend sent her a job posting—Make-A-Wish Mid-South was looking for its next Volunteer Coordinator.

"I read it and immediately thought, 'This is it.' It felt like everything I believed in was wrapped up in one LinkedIn post," Jane recalled.

Now, Jane spends her days juggling emails, coordinating wish granters, and training new recruits.

"No two days are the same," she said in between laughs, "but the best ones? Those are the days I get to connect with our volunteers or attend a wish celebration. I still tear up every time."

Jane's love for Arkansas runs deep, and she's proud of the Make-A-Wish volunteer community.

"There's this shared spirit across the state, a real sense of responsibility to care for each other, especially the kids. It's beautiful."

When asked what she wishes more people knew about volunteering with Make-A-Wish, Jane didn't hesitate to answer:

"People think it might be sad or heavy, but it's actually full of joy. You're helping create moments of pure happiness. They show up with full hearts, they understand the weight of what families are going through, and they know how to make it fun, whether it's a Disney trip or a shopping spree. Her message to anyone thinking about becoming a Wish Granter is simple:

"Do it. You don't need special skills—just a kind heart. You'll help turn dreams into reality, and I promise, it'll change your life too."

Every *wish* begins with a referral

Who is eligible?

Make-A-Wish fulfills wishes for children who:

- have been diagnosed with a critical illness (as defined by Make-A-Wish criteria).
- are between the ages of 2 ½ and 18 at the time of referral.
- have not already received a wish from Make-A-Wish or another wish-granting organization.

Is my child eligible?

Make-A-Wish is connected with all major pediatric hospitals in the region; we recommend speaking to the child's social worker and/or healthcare specialist to see if your child's diagnosis may qualify for a wish as they are often familiar with our medical eligibility criteria. Once referred, Make-A-Wish Mid-South will obtain medical records from your child's physician to determine eligibility for our program.

Who can refer

- A child's parent/guardian or immediate family member
- Medical professional treating the child
- Potential wish child

How to refer

- Visit wish.org/refer-a-child
- Ask your doctor/nurse/social worker/child life specialist to make the referral

Clearing up some misconceptions

- Make-A-Wish is not just for children with a terminal condition. **We serve children with a wide range of life-threatening medical conditions.**
- Every child whose medical condition qualifies will receive a wish without regard to a family's financial and/or citizenship status.
- No child's wish takes away from another's opportunity to receive one.

The Wish Journey

The journey begins once a child is referred and their condition is medically qualified for a wish. The experienced wish-granting team will support the child and their family throughout the entire process.

Thank you to all who walked, donated, and celebrated the power of a wish!

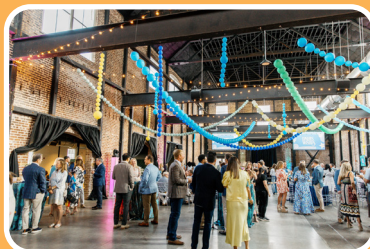


DISHES FOR WISHES
